



## Communiqué

Nicaragua, land of Sandino, which has played a prominent role in the UNFCCC and other United Nations spaces, in the voice of the remembered and respected Dr. Paul Oquist Kelley, forcefully vindicating the demands for climate justice that many of the social organizations of the global south share, including those that make up CAN Latin America. Nicaragua was also one of the first 12 countries to sign the Escazú Agreement, which aims to guarantee the full and effective implementation of the rights of access to information, public participation and access to justice in environmental matters in Latin America and the Caribbean.

From the CAN-Latin America Network (CANLA), we have been surprised and extremely dismayed by the parliamentary and administrative decision to suspend the legal status of Centro Humboldt, an organization with more than 32 years dedicated to promoting sustainable territorial development in Nicaragua and other countries in the region. Centro Humboldt has been a leader in the development and coordination of our climate action throughout the Latin American region and hand in hand with the communities of each territory where they contributed.

Faced with this inexplicable measure, the Board of Directors of the Latin American node of Climate Action Network (CAN Latin America) expresses its solidarity with all the members of Centro Humboldt and announces that the coordination of our Regional Network will remain within the Central American Association Centro Humboldt.
